



Country platforms in the GWP Ecosystem

GWP seeks to establish partnerships for the water sector at various levels.

Two levels where GWP has formalised a corporate approach with a set of rules and guidelines:

- Regional level with "regional water partnerships" (RWPs)
- Country level with "country water partnerships" (CWPs)

In many ways, these partnerships constitute the GWP organisation. The conditions of accreditation aim to ensure that they are well functioning as "multistakeholders platforms" for the water sector.





GWP Country Water Partnerships are:

- Operational mechanisms that bring together GWP registered Partner organisations in a country to improve communications, promote synergies and strengthen coordination
- Neutral platforms for dialogue and consensus building among a broad group of transsectoral stakeholders
- Open to all sectors and stakeholders committed to IWRM and GWP principles
- Regulated via GWP corporate standards/guidelines and a formal agreement between the legal entities representing the RWP and the CWP

Country Water Partnerships are essential facilitators of processes for the implementation of country level water agendas (e.g. SDGs, NAPs, national development planning, etc.)




Network diversity

There is wide diversity across CWPs, including different ambitions and abilities to mobilise of stakeholders and to develop and deliver programmes:

- MSP capacity: Convening capacity, Partner diversity..
- Operational support capacity: Legal status, Finance and administration capacity, Programme management skills, Access to funding..

A key objective of the 2020-2025 GWP Strategy is to equip GWP's country level entities with the necessary operational capacities, leadership skills, partner connections and financial and human resources to deliver the strategy targets in a consistent, reliable, and agile way.

Identification Tool

Process of identifying people/organisations that may influence or be impacted by your project/initiative, i.e. stakeholder;

Clustering Tool

Grouping them according to their levels of interest and power in a project/initiative;






Communication Tool

Determining how best to engage and communicate each of these stakeholder groups throughout.

Step 2. List 10 current and potential stakeholders that might impact an envisioned country initiative






Step 3. Rank stakeholders by power and interest by putting them on the matrix

Power: ability of the stakeholder to alter/change/block the initiative **Interest:** define the stakholder's "stake" in the project




