Cooperation in transboundary basins What are the benefits?

Background

Transboundary water cooperation has the potential to generate many significant benefits for cooperating countries, such as accelerated economic growth, improved human well-being, enhanced environmental sustainability and increased political stability. Nevertheless, many challenges can prevent countries from embracing effective joint management of transboundary waters or delay the process. Realizing the potential benefits of cooperation, including by uncovering previously overlooked benefits and identifying opportunities arising from increased cooperation, can provide arguments and compelling evidence for cooperating.

The presentation of lessons learnt from experiences of cooperation in Central and Eastern Europe will initiate a discussion with participants on the broad range of possible benefits of cooperation in transboundary basins. A panel of experts will then discuss with the audience how a benefit assessment, possibly using the UNECE *Policy Guidance Note on the Benefits of Transboundary Water Cooperation,* can support a transboundary water cooperation process.
