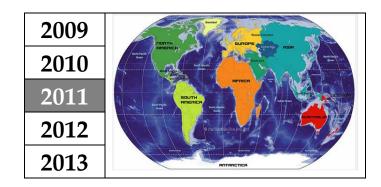

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1 GWPO Work Plan 2011

1.1 Introduction

The GWP's Outcome Mapping approach for planning, monitoring and reporting is supported in this GWPO workplan by the grouping of activities, outputs and resources requirements (human and financial) in a work breakdown structure based on the GWP Strategy and its 18 Strategic Elements (SEs). Each main of the approximately 70 activities in this workplan are described in activity sheet tables which provide the following detailed information:

- GWP Strategic Element No.: which of the GWP Strategic Elements does this activity respond to?
- Activity title: describing the main are of activity
- Activity leader: who within the GWPO is the main individual responsible and accountable for delivery of the outputs?
- Description of the main activities to be carried out: an outline of the main activities to be carried out during the year.
- Main outputs: what are the main deliverables i.e. tangible outputs?
- Estimated human (no of days of individuals) and financial resources (estimated travel and procurement costs): to enable adequate human and financial resources to be clearly defined and made available during the year.
- Distribution of cost for the activity across the 4 Strategic Goals: Even though many activities relate to a specific Strategic Element, most support a range of outcomes across several GWP Strategic Goals. In order to reflect the estimated financial resources by Goal, it is useful to estimate the distribution of these resources.
- Related Outcome Challenges & progress markers: in order to link the activity and output to the Outcome Challenges identified in the 5 year GWPO work programme. These are referred to in each activity sheet by the respective number for the Outcome Challenge.

The detailed activity sheet descriptions, including budgets are provided in the Annex.

1.2 GWPO Management and Coordination

The GWPO comprises 5 entities for management and coordination purposes:

- The Office of the Executive Secretary;
- Three Units for 1) Finance and Administration, 2)
 Communications and 3) Network Operations; and
- The work of the Technical Committee.

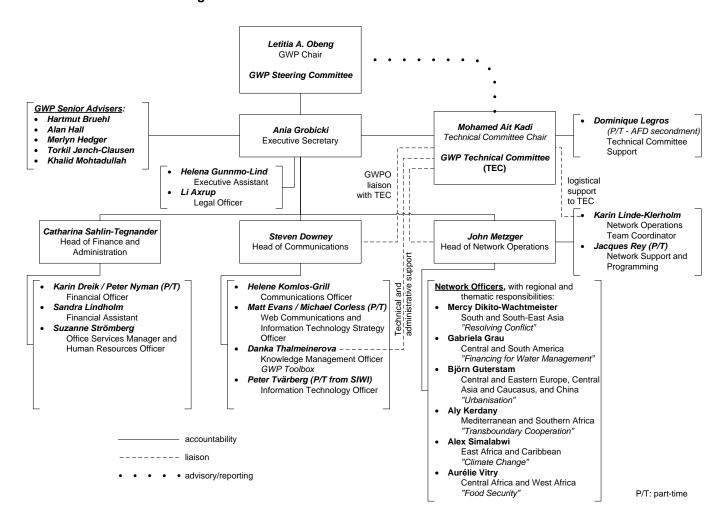

Highlights for 2011 include:

- Monitoring Progress on IWRM: Status Report to the UNCED plus 20 conference on the application of integrated approaches to the development, management and use of water resources
- Develop the GWP-Dundee Scholarship Program International Law and begin implementation, funds permitting

The mandate of the Network Operations Unit is:

- A. To carry out the primary work as GWP Secretariat support to the 13 regions. Each Network Officer is presently assigned at least 2 regions.
- B. More recently, in response to the requirements of the Strategy and in the spirit of the "knowledge chain", Network Officers are taking on increasing responsibilities to support development of thematic aspects of the GWP Strategy.

B. Thematic Focal Points

The Network Officers are increasingly providing essential links in the GWP "knowledge chain" at regional and country levels, as well in coordinating, facilitating and representing the Network globally on the full range of administrative and subject matter areas in the GWP Strategy.

As the role of the Network Officers continues to evolve in response to the requirements of the GWP Strategy, their role in the "knowledge chain" and to emerging development challenges, each of them is now addressing one or more key thematic areas identified in the Strategy. Reflected in the 2011 workplan is their role in supporting the following thematic areas:

Goal 1: Promoting water as a key part of sustainable national development:

- Improving water infrastructure
- Improving financing for water management
- Facilitating transboundary cooperation

<u>Goal 2</u>: Address critical development challenges:

- Adapting to climate change
- Achieving food security
- Tackling urbanisation
- Resolving conflict

The role of the Network Officers in addressing these thematic areas is not so much as technical "experts" – that is left to members of the Technical Committee and others among GWP's knowledge partners, etc. – but to provide the following:

- to act as the focal point link in the GWP knowledge chain within the network and organisation for the purposes of coordination and facilitation of subject-matter related information and knowledge;
- to map GWP's work and progress in specific thematic areas in collaboration with other Network Officers;

- to define an effective role for GWP in addressing the thematic challenge at a global level through developing a realistic *operational strategy* that reflects available human and financial resources;
- to guide and facilitate the implementation of the *operational strategy* including representing GWP in relevant international *fora* and discussions, key global events, and at meetings with GWP's key global allies; and
- to forge synergies and coherence between GWP's global interests in thematic areas, and that of GWP's regions and countries, where regional/country priorities may be expected to prevail.

Performance of global thematic responsibilities is limited to the GWPO Secretariat's interaction with global processes on specific thematic areas and global strategic alliances outlined in GWP strategy. The thematic support at the regional and country levels continues to be coordinated by the Network Officers assigned to specific regions.

The overall knowledge chain link with the Technical Committee is through the Head of Network Operations who participates as "Network Liaison" in Technical Committee meetings. Thematic focal point Network Officers also communicate directly with members of the Technical Committee and *vice-versa* on specific technical issues and challenges as required and requested.

1.3.5 500 Technical Committee

Introduction

The GWP Technical Committee's specific role as defined in the Strategy is in two key areas:

- 1. To provide intellectual leadership to keep GWP at the forefront of new ideas and challenges.
- 2. To provide demand-driven technical support to Regional and Country Partnerships.

2010 was the first working year for the new Technical Committee Chairman and for three new Committee members. What could have been perceived as a constraint was transformed into an opportunity as the Committee members reviewed their agenda, priorities and functional arrangements in line with and in support to the GWP's 2009-2013 vision and mission for a water secure world.

The development of the 2011 Technical Committee workplan was a parallel track process:

- 1. Fulfilment of the Committee's commitments as per the workplan 2010 submitted by the previous transitional chair in consultation with the new chair,
- 2. Development of a 2010-2012 road map based on:
 - a. the assessment of what the Committee can actually do, how and with what resources,
 - b. the definition of new strategic orientations regarding the focus, selectivity and partnerships, and
 - c. the road map (2010-2012) addressing challenges/solutions regarding priority issues.

The 2011 workplan for the Technical Committee is built on two major orientations:

Proposed 2011 activities

In direct alignment with the GWP's four strategic goals and related outcomes, the Technical Committee workplan is divided into a limited number of priority activities described below with indicators of implementation for each ones. The Technical Committee reports twice-yearly to the Steering Committee on progress against these indicators, as measures of effective implementation.

Goal 1: Promote water as a key part of sustainable national development

Improving water resources management and putting IWRM into practice

A critical aspect of this goal is ensuring effective uptake and dissemination. The learning and knowledge gained through the application of IWRM principles by the GWP network must be translated into sound technical support, which assists the network to achieve this operational goal for water security.

The members of the Technical Committee then worked to develop a demand-responsive set of follow up activities with its partners, including capacity development, workshops and seminars. This activity will be linked to the development of thematic areas for the work of the Technical Committee, in particular of the food security area. Regional workshops on water and food security building on case studies will provide a critical view of challenges, solutions and stories, which will be disseminated from and to GWP regions. This will create a learning process on triggering water policy changes.

2.3 GWPO 2011 consolidated budget by expenditures

The GWP workplan was designed with the assumption of a 3,60 MEuros budget for GWPO (out of a total GWP core budget of 6.1MEuros), pending signature of three agreements with core donors. An alternate workplan & budget has also been designed, at the request of the GWP Steering Committee, with a working budget of 2,98 MEuros.

2.4 GWPO 2011 budget by activities

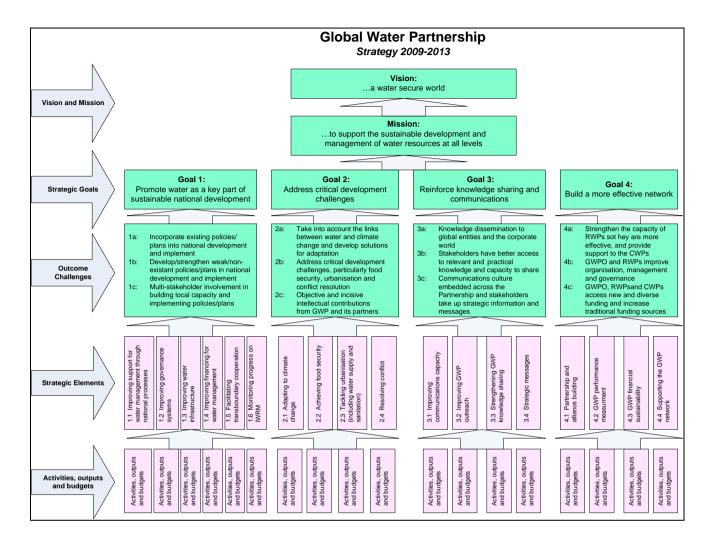
The 2011 budget per activity is provided below (for both the "continuity" and the working scenario).

Compared to the continuity budget, the working budget reflects changes mainly in the following areas: 1) significantly reduced travel, 2) limited use of external consultants and advisers, 3) reduced activities in support of the GWP ToolBox maintenance and development, 4) a tight budget under which the Technical Committee must work, and 4) electronic only meetings of the Steering Committee.

2.4 Resolving conflicts
408 Supporting dialogues that emphasise negotiation and compromise and
allow optimal choices
Work regarding this strategic activity evolves around supporting regional dialogues that create the space for stakeholders to dialogue, think through water conflict aspects and arrive at negotiated and compromise solutions that reflect stakeholder choices for achieving optimal benefits for all. The importance of dialogues of this nature emanate from the fact that demand for water, degradation of water & related natural resources, climate variability, and rural urban migration and conflicts over water and related resources have increased, and that this increases the possibility of serious conflicts over water and negative impacts on vulnerable groups, including the poor. The framework for resolving conflicts is the UN Charter article 1 which provides for maintaining international peace and security and promoting fundamental freedoms of all thru the peaceful management of the world's water resources locally, regionally, and globally. Key to this at the international level is the UN Watercourses Convention.
 This work in this area will: Facilitate good understanding by the network officer and the Network of the UN Charter article 1, which provides the framework for looking at resolving water conflicts, locally, regionally and globally. From the information available from the regions, map out the conflict resolutions activities that the network is involved in, and monitor their evolution through the GWP monitoring system. Feed, inform and catalyse the GWP knowledge chain with approaches/strategies to better understand water related conflicts and realistic scenarios for conflict resolution for practitioners and policy makers.
 An annotated summary of 13 regional work plan 2010 activities regarding conflict resolution prepared and shared with the NO team. Half yearly summary of 13 regions output reports on conflict resolution activities prepared and shared with the NOs. Patricia Wouters (Resource person) (and if funds allow a social scientist, most likely Prof Shantha ³from Bangalore India) will have visited GWPO to have half day session with Network Officer on the UNCharter Article 1 (Law of Nations) and the legal and social perspectives to resolving conflicts, by June 2011. If funding situation does not allow, Shantha will only share written work on experiences from the ground, i.e interstate river water sharing of rivers in South of India. This provides the legal and social context for understanding conflict resolution.
