Seminar: Water and Energy: Getting the Priorities Right for Smallholder Farmers

Description:

Smallholder farmers have a major stake in the water-energy-food nexus and in policies and strategies used to drive coherence and sustainability across these sectors. They make up the majority of farmers in most developing countries and have the most to lose from ineffective policies. Yet, the voices of smallholders are rare in current dialogues on water and energy or even water for food.

This seminar will explore water management and energy development that will better meet the needs of smallholder farmers. It will assess how applications of green water management change options for rural water, associated energy development and watershed management.

Rudolph Cleveringa, who has recently joined GWP as Deputy Executive Secretary, will present Investment Priorities for Water and Energy in Smallholder Agriculture.

New Publications



Groundwater Governance and Irrigated Agriculture, No. 19

This Background Paper provides an excellent overview of the global groundwater economy and assesses the opportunities it offers for irrigated agriculture and also the risks it poses for depleting and degrading aquifer systems. A review of the various 'groundwater governance models' suggests that while each has merit, none can claim to have achieved the sustainable use of groundwater. The author emphasizes that the socio-ecological and political environment is critical in determining the elements of an appropriate groundwater governance regime.



Water Security: Putting the Concept Into Practice, No. 20

This Background Paper describes the journey over two decades in which the process of integrating water resources management has developed and is reaching adulthood. The paper says that water security can never fully be achieved because ever-changing physical and economic conditions will require the continuous adaptation of water systems and behaviours to meet growing demands and changing climatic conditions. The authors examine two approaches to increasing water security: the developmental approach seeking to increase water security over time, and the risk-based approach


focusing on managing risks and reducing vulnerabilities resulting from climate variability and water-related disasters.



The links between land use and groundwater – Governance provisions and management strategies to secure a 'sustainable harvest'

This Perspectives Paper argues that a common understanding of the interaction between groundwater and land is needed. This will facilitate cross-sector dialogue on governance needs and management approaches, targeted at sustaining water resources and enhancing land productivity.





"Proceedings from the GWP workshop: Assessing water security with appropriate indicators"
