1. ICID and the African Regional Working Group

1.1 The International Commission on Irrigation and Drainage (ICID)

The International Commission on Irrigation and Drainage (ICID), **established in 1950**, is a leading scientific, technical, international not-for-profit, non-governmental organization. ICID operates through a professional network of experts from across the world in the field of irrigation, drainage, and flood management.

ICID provides a knowledge sharing platform dedicated to issues that covers the entire spectrum of agricultural water management practices ranging from rainfed agriculture to supplemental irrigation, land drainage, deficit irrigation to full irrigation, etc. In addition, drainage of agricultural lands forms the core theme of commission's activities. Floods and drought, the two extremes of increasingly variable climate as a result of potential climate change, also form the focus of activities.

The irrigation and drainage sector is an important contributor to rural development. Irrigation and drainage systems and professionals play an increasingly crucial role in eradication of rural poverty by creating sustainable livelihoods for the majority of rural population, particularly in developing countries, and by supporting healthy living environments. It is therefore appropriate for ICID to realign its vision and dedicate itself to a mission that supports sustainable rural development. Thus, ICID aims to create “*A water secure World free of poverty and hunger through sustainable rural development*” by “*Facilitating prudent agriculture water management by encouraging inter-disciplinary approaches to irrigation and drainage management*”

1.2 The African Regional Working Group of the ICID

To address the various issue related to agricultural water management specific to Africa, ICID established the African Regional Working Group (AFRWG) in 2000 with an objective of promoting strong communications and networking among the African countries as well as regional and international institutions for enhancing cooperation and coordination and to support integrated river basin development, training and research issues and information system for African needs. This led to the establishment of the African Young Water Professionals Forum (Af-YWPF) which will be holding its Third Forum from 19-21 October 2020 (Online) under the platform of Cairo Water Week (CWW) 2020. The AFRWG has held four remarkable regional conferences since its establishment and is scheduled to host the **5th African Regional Conference on Irrigation and Drainage (ARCID)**, **March 2021** (depending on Covid-19 situation), Marrakech, Morocco on the theme “Sustainable Management of Irrigation for Improved Resilience of Agriculture in Africa.”



2. The African Young Water Professionals Forum

ICID took the initiative of establishing the Young Professionals Forum aimed at building the capacity of young professionals and creating a new generation capable for facing future water challenges,. This Forum is now an international platform for young irrigation and drainage professional from around the world with more than **2800 members**; mainstreaming youths towards the abundant rewarding opportunities in irrigation agriculture..

The African Young Water Professionals Forum (Af-YWPF) was the outcome of a decision taken during the 28th meeting of the African Regional Working Group (AFRWG) held in Mexico City, Mexico, October 2017, where it was decided to establish the African Young Water Professional Forum (Af-YWPF); The first meeting of the Af-YWPF was held in October 2018 during the First Cairo Water Week.

The Forum was established with the objective of bringing together Africa's future leaders from the private sector, research and government institutions around the central theme of water conservation for sustainable development. The water professionals would get an opportunity to showcase their knowledge and contribution to sustainable water management in an international setting, discuss what they learned from their experiences, and to broaden the mind and thinking of new and experienced water professionals.

Mandate

The African Young Water Professionals Forum (Af-YWPF) first convened in October 2018 with the following mandates among others.

1. Encourage and promote a high standard of professional development amongst the young professionals in the field of irrigation, drainage, and flood management;
2. Provide a platform for African young water, irrigation and drainage professionals, to exchange information, ideas, tools, experiences and possibly develop an Af-YWPF Mentorship program;
3. Expose African Young Water Professional to ICID's aims, objectives, role and activities;
4. Maintain and strengthen linkages with national and international youths having interests in water-related subjects or the activities, as relevant to ICID objectives.
5. Af-YWPF would also organize e-discussions and webinars through an e-forum (Af-YWFeF) on the topics of interest to African Young Water Professionals. Share the knowledge generated at individual and institutional level for mutual benefit of the agricultural water management community across Africa and the World.



2.1 LinkedIn Group

Outside training programs, workshops and conferences, the forum exists an e-Forum (Af-YWPeF) on [LinkedIn](#) to keep active engagement of members and to facilitate knowledge sharing. In less than a year of establishment, the forum has risen to a membership base of about **2800 professionals and experts** in the field of agricultural water management. Interaction is usually through e-discussions and Webinars organised Monthly (<https://www.linkedin.com/groups/12143964>).

2.2 e-discussions

To encourage and intensify the active participation of Young Professionals in ICID activities in the domain of irrigation, drainage and flood management, IYPeF organizes a series of e-discussions and webinars as per the mandate to enable the young professionals to contribute their views on topics of interest with specific focus on AWM issues under varying climatic conditions. Af-YWPeF in consultation with AFRWG, identifies topics for e-discussion for a duration of two weeks. Each coordinator takes the lead for an e-discussion to coordinate and prepare a concept note giving brief introduction, objective, scope and expected outcome from the e-discussion on its completion. ICID (Central Office) in consultation with the relevant WGs help identify and assign one expert as Mentor for e-discussion and Af-YWPeF Coordinators are also encouraged to approach suitable mentors. The mentor will steer the discussion with his valuable inputs pertaining to the subject matter to make it more informative, insightful and enriching.

2.3 Webinars

ICID, under its policy for wider knowledge dissemination has been taking the lead to organize webinars for its members, in particular and wider irrigation and drainage community in general to promote active participation and bring a common understanding among the various stakeholders in the irrigation and drainage sector, particularly AWM. ICID through its webinars under Professional and Young Professional series facilitate various experts/speakers to present their innovations and other related topics to be recognized at an international level. 2.4 Young Professional Training Programs and Workshops

ICID as part of its capacity development program and to attract young minds to Agricultural Water Management (AWM) sector has been organizing training programs and workshops for the YPs regionally and internationally. The main objectives of the training program/workshops are:

- To capacitate the young engineers in the area of irrigation and drainage sector and motivate them to work for the national development of their countries.
- To share innovative idea of irrigation and drainage, recent technology and others from different parts of the world (learning from key resource persons, exchange of ideas amongst the participants and providing opportunity to network with the international delegates).
- To provide exposure to the budding young professionals through capacity development.

4. The Third African Young Professionals Training Workshop

Owing to the success of the 1st Af-YWPF and 2nd Af-YWPF, the forum has grown to attract more than **2800 members** from all African countries, thus becoming an important platform on the African continent for capacity development of Africa's future leaders in water-related sectors. Thus, the MWRI of Egypt, AFRWG of the ICID, ENCID and ICID will host the 3rd Af-YWPF at the Cairo Water Week 2020. The three-day forum will include the forum meeting, training workshop and converge with activities of the CWW 2020 to give YP's the opportunity to engage with experts and stakeholders in the water sector through interactive sessions, hands-on training workshops as well as seminars.

The event is organised by the African Regional Working Group of the ICID and presents an opportunity for panel questions and networking. At the workshop, presenters, facilitators, and trainers will share their experiences in the area of innovation, inspire participants and instil the confidence for them to voice their thoughts and ideas on ways to overcome challenges of water scarcity, particularly in the agricultural sector with a focus on water management.

4.1 Training Topics: Accurate estimation of crop water requirements and irrigation scheduling: This training encompasses five (5) sessions to demonstrate how to access remotely sensed water productivity data; monitor water productivity and identify gaps; promote interactive discussions to reduce gaps in water productivity and increase agricultural production; compare remotely-sensed data to measured data provided by workshop participants; evaluate projected evapotranspiration data using regional climate modelling outputs; and to estimate future water productivity using projected evapotranspiration data. Also, one session will use case studies based on field experiences to discuss how climate change impacts agricultural productivity and explore innovative technologies that can support inclusive and sustainable agriculture and benefit vulnerable groups.

Role of gender to achieve SDG's: This topic will be covered in one (1) session which will draw from experts how women and girls – especially those living in poverty – are disproportionately affected by a lack of water and sanitation services, making SDG 5 and 6 fundamentally interdependent. For example, inadequate sanitation and hygiene put women's health and survival at risk during pregnancy and childbirth. In addition, girls may drop out of school or suffer psychological stress because of the lack of adequate sanitation and hygiene facilities in their communities.


